'Migration and Mobility in the Neolithic: Interdisciplinary Dialogues'

In recent years, aDNA has opened completely new perspectives for prehistoric archaeology: suddenly, it is possible to directly address the hitherto rather intractable question of migration. Initial applications to Neolithic skeletons have already revealed that multiple migration events took place, some of them potentially on a large scale. The Neolithic has been a particular focus of aDNA research, which has been combined with archaeological and increasingly also with linguistic evidence to provide (not so?) new and sometimes controversial narratives.

Therefore, the need for interdisciplinary dialogue has never been higher. While there has been much productive collaboration already, there are also very different research traditions, expectations and approaches. So how can we best combine 'headlines' in *Nature* or *Science* with the details of particular archaeological and linguistic studies? And how can we actually distinguish between different migration scenarios?

These are just some of the issues this workshop aims to address. We hope that this will provide an opportunity for archaeologists, archaeogeneticists and linguists, as well as an interested audience, to find space for fruitful discussion. A preliminary programme is included.
